Bridges

It's summer and, among other things, summer means road construction in the UP. As we traveled across the peninsula on M-28 during our recent trip out west, Arlene and I encountered several places where traffic was stopped and we had to wait, either for a stoplight to change or for a pilot car to usher us along a one lane road.

At Trout Creek, for example, there was bridge work going on. It's a small creek, really, just a few feet wide, but rebuilding any bridge is a challenging project. It takes a lot of time and a lot of engineering expertise! Later, we encountered other bridges, including one over the raging, glacial torrent of the Athabasca River in Canada. There were people in wet suits and hard hats using a rubber raft to access the pilings below.

When you stop to think about it, bridges are practical marvels. What would we do without bridges across the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers? Or without the Mackinac Bridge linking Michigan's two peninsulas? Actually, we know what **that** was like: waiting for a ferry or taking a very, very long way around.

Bridges connect places. But of course, bridges also connect people. And at this time in our life as Americans—an election year—and not just any election year, but a supercharged and very tense election year, this is a time when bridges need building. We live in a divided country, in a divided world. It has always been so, but for the moment, it seems especially so. There are cries that we should be united, as Americans and as human beings. But unity is elusive.



It may help to think of the cross as a bridge, that connects groups of people to one another. God's grace has reconciling power. None of us is perfect, no one has all the answers. To put it biblically, "No one is righteous, no, not one," for "all have fallen short of the glory of God." But in Christ, all are received into God's mercy, forgiven, loved, and given the opportunity to grow into the purpose for which we were created. There is no distinction. We're all in the same boat. Or, to use the image above, we're can only cross the river on the same bridge.

Sometimes we think that all Christians should have the same opinions about things like taxes and Medicare and immigration and abortion. But people of conscience, who seek "to love God with their whole heart and their neighbor as ourselves," will nonetheless see different ways to make that happen. I don't think that will ever change. But we can still treat each other as sisters and brothers, redeemed by Christ, and beloved of God. We can try to understand each other. We can agree to disagree. The love of Christ breaks down human hostility.

Perhaps this is a good time to see yourself as part of God's construction crew, working on bridge repair. Christ is the solid foundation, but it's up to us to be doing the paving, the striping, and so on. Can you repair a bridge? Can you connect to someone you know on the other side of the divide, as your fellow human being for whom Christ died?

Sometimes people who are not Christian "get this" better when we do. While on our trip, my wife was walking down a street in Winnipeg, Manitoba, when a perfect stranger—and clearly an indigenous man—said to her: "Hello, cousin!" You can't say it any better than that.
