#### Fresh Air

Walking outside the other say, I recalled a line from a song by the 60's rock group Jefferson Airplane: "Summer has inhaled and held it's breath too long." Those words lodged in my mind because they accurately describe this time of year. We all love summer in the UP, but we can see it beginning to fade. The bright green of spring and the deeper green of July isn't quite the same in late August. The ferns have yellow and brown spots. The showy wildflowers of spring and summer have given way to asters and goldenrod, and those invasive purple knapweed flowers taking over the roadsides. A few maples are turning bright red and orange, but mostly, the woods just look a little tired.

Alongside the changes in flora, there are also changes in the rhythms of life. The kids are back in school—and yellow buses are there to remind us, morning and night. Vacations have ended. The long days are growing shorter—it's darker when we get up in the morning and in the evening, dusk arrives earlier every day.

Summer has nearly run its course. We may wish we could hold onto summer for a while longer or even turn the clock back to May 30! But of course, we can't.

Fall is a season of transition. Not all that comes with the transition is bad! September and October will bring its brief, but glorious display of orange, yellow, and red. When the trees drop their leaves, we'll see further into the trees, more of the horizon. With the cooler weather, mosquitoes and flies disappear. Gardens and orchards offer their bounties. Many of us will enjoy football games and hunting season. Then: Thanksgiving and the Holidays.

Finally, the snow will come and with it, a different kind of beauty. We can wait awhile for that. As I overheard Gary Parkkonen say to Keith Polkinghorne the other night: "Don't put the plow on your truck yet!" It'll come soon enough. We are in the season of transition.

The Church is in a season of transition, too. It sometimes feels like we've inhaled and held our breath too long. There are fewer of us and we are older than we once were. We feel a little tired. We remember days when the pews were full for worship at Bethany. When kids flocked to Vacation Bible School at Emanuel. When the activity calendar was packed with events and classes and opportunities. It's not quite the same these days.

I recently preached at a church I once served. Back in the 1980's, we averaged between 300 and 400 people every Sunday. The week before I led worship, the total attendance was 65. It was pretty shocking to see that number in black and white!

What's going on? Has the gospel lost its appeal in this version of American life? If so, why? Is there something different we could have done? Sometimes we wish we could turn the clock back about fifty years. But of course, we can't.

Instead of wishing for the past, I would invite you to look to the future re-newed Church with joy and anticipation. It does no good to inhale and hold your breath too long! Rather, let the Spirit of God blow through us, filling our lungs with newness of life and vision, as at Pentecost.

We don't know exactly what that church may look like. It may be smaller. There may be fewer buildings. There may be more lay ministers and fewer ordained ministers. We don't know at this time, just what that church will look like. But we do know it will be God's church, the resurrected body of Jesus Christ, even as it is now. We know the gospel will be proclaimed and lived. God's grace and love will not—cannot—fail, now or ever.

So breathe deep, people of Emanuel and Bethany. Open your hearts and ears and eyes to change. Pray for the Spirit's guidance. Allow yourself to be an instrument of Christ's redeeming love in these days of transition.

Saima created a poster board with several photos of her experience that is in the fellowship hall. Here is a summary of their times at the gathering!

My trip to New Orleans was wonderful. Every night we got to see a different concert. I loved dancing and singing along with everyone. On the first day, I got to go on a riverboat tour. They served catfish and it was actually really good. There was live jazz which I loved.

The next day we got to spend some hours in the convention center. There was a bunch of activities there like badminton, bouncy houses, and painting. I really liked it. There was even hammocks there where you could rest.

On the third day, we went back to the convention center and watched a documentary about the New Orleans marching band. They got to play for us after the documentary. Then we got to follow them in a parade and carry hurricane supply buckets. After that, we went to get lunch and got to see some gift shops. I bought a snow globe. I also got beignets and they tasted amazing.

On the last day we went to one of the concert things in the morning and everyone had communion there. A couple hours later, we went on a ghost tour. That was the last thing we did on the trip.

Overall, my trip to New Orleans was fantastic. I got to explore a new city, see incredible concerts, try delicious food, and participate in fun activities. Thank you so much for your help with the trip. It means a lot to me.

Thank you so much for supporting our trip to the ELCA youth gathering in New Orleans. The experience was unforgettable and will always be treasured.

Each morning thousands of youth in colored t-shirts walked to the Ernest N. Morial Conference Center next to the Mississippi River. Inside was a giant "playground" for teens with everything from badminton, to bounce houses, to pickleball, to board games. The other half contained learning opportunities and faith and community-based activities.

Our group watched a documentary (The Whole Gritty City) about music and marching band opportunities for challenged communities (youth) in New Orleans. We learned how culturally important this was to the community and how a few dedicated people were able to start a program that continues to build youth up mentally and prepares them for adulthood. The band directors and one of the marching bands entered at the end and we marched behind them with buckets prepared for hurricane relief.

We also led a church service one morning and each evening we walked to the Smoothie King Center (where the Pelicans play) for the night program called the "Mass Gathering". Here we heard incredible speakers and bands; our group was down on the floor with the bands on 2 of the nights. The speakers were inspirational (I highly recommend looking up Jacqueline Bussie) to both youth and adults from all walks of life. The message of inclusivity throughout was outstanding and I was proud to be attending such a diverse program.

Also, the sense of community was very strong. Groups brought bracelets, crosses, and other trinkets to hand out to each other during our long walks through the city. After the Mass Gathering, fun chants and songs filled the city as thousands returned to their hotels.

Lastly, what a blessing youth leader Stacy McEachern from Negaunee is....(and the others leading our group). Stacy made smoothies and hosted a breakfast bar in her hotel room each morning and took on the overwhelming task of chaperoning teenagers in a large city, which she organized effortlessly.
